

“K-DIDDY” AND “KING OF TEARS”: TOP KOREAN ACTOR FACES ALLEGATIONS OF DATING A MINOR

Earning the title of Korea's highest-paid actor, Kim Soohyun has long been regarded as one of the faces of the Korean entertainment industry. However, he has recently been embroiled in controversy surrounding the late actress Kim Saeron, raising broader questions about the Korean entertainment industry and the treatment of women in Korea at large.

The controversy began on Monday, March 10th, when the popular YouTube channel Garo Sero Institute uploaded a video with Kim Saeron's aunt. She claimed that Kim Soohyun, then 27 years old, had been in a romantic relationship with Kim Saeron who was just 15 years old at the time.



This followed news of Kim Saeron's suicide on February 16th, Kim Soohyun's birthday. Kim Saeron was considered a rising star on the film scene, making her acting debut at just 9 years old with the film *A Brand New Life* in 2009. Afterward, she appeared in numerous films and TV dramas until she was reported to be driving under the influence in May 2022.

The incident resulted in property damages which caused a power outage impacting 57 stores in the vicinity. Kim Saeron was fined 20 million won (\$19,000 CAD). The case soon blew up in the Korean media, leading to public backlash and criticism. Kim Saeron was dropped from many endorsements and projects, including the drama series *Trolley* and *Bloodhounds*.

At the time, she was being managed by Gold Medalist, an entertainment company established by Kim Soohyun. The company also manages Kim Soohyun as an actor. Her contract expired at the end of 2022, after which Gold Medalist sent an official notice for debt repayment

of 700 million won (\$700,000 CAD) to pay for legal settlement and project contract cancellations costs.

Kim Saeron's aunt criticized the agency for alleged financial misconduct and manipulation, claiming they had stated they would take responsibility for the issue as Kim Saeron's representative, only to demand compensation afterward. Her attorney stated that at the time Kim Saeron had insufficient assets to pay off the debt as her income had been used to support her parents' business.

When questioned by a news reporter, Gold Medalist claimed they only sent the notice of the fee following standard procedure. “We had no intention of receiving money from Kim Saeron,” the company stated.

However, Kim Saeron was not informed of this. She was allegedly told that she would be sued if she did not pay this money back. She reached out to Kim Soohyun. Screenshots of the text are circulating online. “I really can't do anything,” Kim Saeron stated in the message. “It's not that I won't [pay you back], it's that I can't. Do you really have to take it as far as a lawsuit?”

Kim Soohyun did not respond. In an attempt to get his attention, Kim Saeron uploaded a picture of them together on her Instagram before taking it down shortly afterward. This only served to fuel public criticism of her, as many claimed she was attention-seeking and delusional. Kim Soohyun denied having any relationship with Kim Saeron on that occasion.

It was after her suicide that the public began to consider claims of their relationship more seriously. Kim Saeron's aunt stated that the relationship lasted for six years and that there were even talks of marriage between the two. Kim Saeron allegedly joined Gold Medalist because of their relationship.

Gold Medalist responded by releasing

a statement refuting the claims. “These malicious claims directed at our company and actor Kim Soo Hyun are entirely false and cannot be tolerated under any circumstances. We are currently reviewing the strongest possible legal actions against [Garo Sero Institute] for spreading these falsehoods.” The statement was as far as saying that “the dissemination of such false information by [Garo Sero Institute] mirrors the very behavior of so-called “cyber wreckers” that caused the late actress so much pain during her lifetime.”

Initially, fans appeared to be split on the issue, unsure of whether the issue was true or not. Kim Soohyun recently held a press conference on March 31, 2025, where he revealed that they were in a relationship for about a year, but only after Kim Saeron became an adult.

“This whole time, I've been focused on protecting what I have,” he said. “Every time there was a clash between human Kim Soo Hyun and ‘Star Kim Soo Hyun,’ I ended up making the best decision for the Star Kim Soo Hyun. And it made me terrified every single day.” He apologized, stating that he would accept any disapproval of his choice to hide their

relationship.

However, he continued to deny the allegations that he had dated Kim Saeron as a minor.

"I did not date her when she was a minor," he stated. "Apart from the fact that we were both actors, we were just an ordinary couple like anyone else. We had feelings for each other, and as time passed, we eventually parted ways. After that, we rarely kept in touch."

He also denied any allegations of having any involvement in her suicide. "It is also not true that the deceased made a tragic choice because of my avoidance (of her), or because my agency pressured her about debt."

Kim Soohyun refused to take any questions during the press conference. Afterward, public sentiment began to turn against him, viewing his tearful performance as insincere. Evidence of their relationship began to surface, including photos, text messages, and letters.

"Somebody give him an Oscar," a TikTok user commented. "There's a reason he's the top-paid actor in K-dramas." Internet users scanned the script Kim Soohyun was seen reading and reported it was approximately 93% AI-generated. Social media users have since dubbed Kim Soohyun "K-diddy," a moniker from rap

artist P-diddy who underwent similar allegations. He has also been nicknamed "King of Tears," a play on the title of one of his most recent projects, the drama series Queen of Tears.

Facing public pressure, brands such as Prada, Dinto, and Y.O.U. have begun to drop Kim Soohyun. However, he is currently filming a Disney+ Show, Knock Off. Disney+ has made no mention of removing the actor from the cast list, although they have frozen the show, with reports of it not being currently scheduled to release.

Fans demand that the show remove Kim Soohyun immediately. "Do you realize how crazy this is? If it were a woman, she would have been dropped and canceled without hesitation," one user stated. "But because it's a man, nothing's done. I mean they still give roles to known abusers and rapists, so honestly, why are we even surprised?"

This issue brings up broader implications of how women are viewed in Korea, both in the entertainment industry and in everyday society. In fact, female celebrities tend to face harsher scrutiny, criticism, and condemnation, both from the public and the industry. Actor Lee Jung-jae was reported to have been in a DUI incident twice. However, in contrast to Kim Saeron, he recently filmed the second series of the hit drama series Squid Game 2 and is regarded as a talented and successful actor by the Korean public.

"It's not that Kim Saeron didn't do anything wrong. But if the entertainment industry is going to be so harsh on guilty celebrities, why are male celebrities with DUI and sex crime histories still active everywhere?" a social media user stated. Even after Kim Saeron attempted to work part-time jobs to pay off her debt, such as in cafes or restaurants, the Korean public continued to ridicule her, nicknaming her "drunk-driving Kim Saeron" and "shameless."

Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at Yale University, Na Jong-ho, stated that this was the type of unhealthy pressure society must avoid. "A society that buries people without giving them a second chance after a mistake is not a healthy one."

This also opens up conversations regarding the opportunities this kind of public pressure presents for systemic abuse and manipulation. Female celebrities are particularly vulnerable to being exploited, as they are forced to keep issues hidden in fear of generating a scandal and losing public support.

Kim Saeron's family claims they approached multiple new outlets and reports regarding the story about Kim Soohyun, however, none were willing to take the story against Kim Soohyun. Insiders allege that the two actors' relationship was an "open industry secret," but that Kim Soohyun had too much money and influence for any action to be taken.

The controversy has led to a petition being submitted to the National Assembly on March 31. Over 40,000 people signed the petition, calling to amend statutory rape laws to include ages 13 to 19. Currently, the law only protects individuals aged 13 to 16, leaving no legal basis to convict Kim Soohyun. Petitioners have dubbed the law "the Kim Soohyun Prevention Act."

In fact, the legal age for consent in Korea was only raised to 16 years old in 2020 -- before that, it had been just 13 years old. Many believe that this is insufficient protection for minors, leaving them vulnerable to being manipulated and groomed. There are also calls for the consent age to be raised to 19 years old.

This kind of systemic bias against women has long been prevalent in Korea, leading to the rise of the 4B movement -- a radical feminist movement based on four Korean words starting with the syllable "bi": bihon: no marriage; bichulsan: no childbirth; biyeonae: no dating and bisekseu: no sex.

The 4B movement, while allowing women to express their discontent against the patriarchal and conservative nature of Korea, has led to criticism for being too extreme. "Many young men and some women equate all feminists with man-haters, which deepens societal divisions," stated Clemson University sociology lecturer, Minyoung Moon.

"You're treated like the devil," said Lee Jeongeun, a Korean citizen. The term "feminist" has begun to be considered an insult or a swear in Korean society. The gender divide carries real implications; former President Yoon Seok Yeol leveraged this gender divide in the 2022 election to win with the support of male voters. When he took office, he gutted the Ministry for Gender Equality and Family.

Similarly, with the re-election of Trump, the 4B movement has begun to gain popularity in America as well. "Good luck getting laid, especially in Florida! Because me and my girlies are participating in the 4B movement," an American content creator said in a video. Another asked,

"Why exactly are you going to keep becoming subservient to a nation that literally doesn't care about you?"

While the movement is gaining momentum, it is unlikely to have any lasting repercussions. There is a false notion in America that the 4B movement is particularly liberating or empowering. In reality, it simply reflects the circumstances that most South Korean women find themselves in. The low birth rates and a decreasing marriage rate are not an active choice -- they simply reflect women's desire to avoid dealing with Korea's patriarchal expectations for motherhood and marriage. This is also exacerbated by the extreme gender pay gap and the growing cost of living in the country.

"Both in Korea and in the U.S., there's a temptation to treat 4B as a substantive doctrine rather than a lifestyle choice," wrote Tammy Kim in an article about the 4B movement for the New Yorker. In America, it is treated as a rallying cry that distorts the reality that South Korean women face today. This version of the movement only lives comfortably on social media and poses the threat of completely erasing the context and environment that led to its creation. No tangible change can be created.



Many warn against going too far in dividing the two genders. "If you were to ask me whether gender consciousness has improved," Jung Choon-saeng, a member of the National Assembly stated, "I'd have to say that, because of the current backlash, it's, in fact, got worse." This makes it more difficult for men and women to work together to address current issues with the legislation, such as the statutory rape laws that keep Kim Soohyun innocent.

If the petition is signed by 50,000 people by the end of April, it will proceed to be reviewed by a committee which will then make the decision whether to submit it to lawmakers. Meanwhile, Gold Medalist has filed a 12 billion won (\$10,000,000 CAD) lawsuit against Kim Saeron's family and Garo Sero Institute. As the court investigates the charges, the case continues to develop.

Tell us a little bit about yourself: hobbies, music, where you grew up, what sports you play, etc.

I was born and raised in Calgary; my mom's side of the family were some of the first non-indigenous settlers in Southern Alberta, so it's kind of funny that she married a Scot with the last name Crowfoot. 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OSTARA: EASTER'S PAGAN PAST

The holiday of Easter is well-known across the globe. We associate this spring day with eggs, rabbits, and pastel colours, but where did these important elements linked to Easter really come from?

Ostara is rooted in the ancient seasonal celebrations and traditions of paganism. Being one of the eight Sabbaths of modern paganism, Ostara celebrates the spring equinox. The word "Ostara" comes from the Anglo-Saxon name of the goddess, Eostre. This Germanic goddess represents the spring season and new beginnings, and of course, the honoring of the divine feminine is an important part of this celebration.

Ostara, the spring equinox, lands on March 20th this year. This date not only recognizes the time of balance, when day and night are of equal length, but it also celebrates the return of the sun from the cold winter months. The Earth's fertility and colourful, fresh growth associated with spring recognizes the awakening of nature, its renewal, and rebirth. Through various rituals, feasts, and offerings, the Norse and Germanic peoples held this date very close to their hearts as

the spring equinox was symbolic of the brighter days ahead.

Hares were traditionally an important symbol of Ostara, which translates into the familiar symbol tied to Easter today. The hare is associated with fertility and abundance, along with the energy of the new season. Eggs were also significant, with Druids being said to dye eggs from pigmented plants and then bury them in the newly plowed fields in late winter to draw life force and energy into the land, encouraging fertility and abundance for their crops.

The mythological story of the goddess Eostre encloses the origins of Ostara's key symbols; "One day, as the goddess Eostre walked through a forest she came across an injured bird. Seeing the bird so near to death grieved the goddess' heart, so she decided to save the bird. Eostre transformed the injured bird into a healthy young rabbit. When the bird awoke she found herself healed and changed from her former state but not through a complete transformation. The former bird discovered that even as a rabbit she could lay eggs. Happy to have another chance at life, the rabbit decorated the eggs she laid and gave them to Eostre as an offering of thanks".

The Ancient pagan celebrations were passed down orally from generation to

generation. When Christianity dominated certain pagan lands, the oral traditions were slowly extinguished, as well as many of the ancient practices associated with them. To create ease with the forced conversion of the Germanic, Celtic, and Norse pagans into Christianity, they took these traditions and symbols and adopted them into modern-day Easter, which celebrates Christ's resurrection. The date of Ostara was closely translated to the date of Easter because the Council of Nicaea in 325 CE established that the holiday would be held on the Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the vernal equinox. This creates the grounds that the Christian holiday may have been influenced by and even built upon pre-existing pagan traditions to facilitate mass conversion (such as Yule for Christmas, Samhain for Halloween, and Mabon for Thanksgiving).

During this Modern age, pagans now celebrate Ostara by performing spring cleaning, planting seeds, decorating altars in honour of the spring goddess, and of course spending time in nature to re-energize and recharge their spirits. Now, with a deepened understanding of this ancient practice, make sure to take the time to honour nature and capture the joyful energy that the spring season brings us each year. WHY CHESS IS UNDENIABLY A SPORT

In a world where physical prowess is often the cornerstone of competitive recognition, it is important to reflect on what defines a sport. While most associate sports with physical endurance and movement, a broader understanding recognizes that competition, skill, discipline, and structured rules are equally essential aspects. With this framework in mind, chess—though devoid of intense physical activity—clearly qualifies as a legitimate sport. It demands rigorous training, strategic mastery, and emotional resilience, all while adhering to a regulated system of international competition.

At its core, sport is an organized competitive activity that involves skill, training, and a codified set of rules. Chess meets all of these criteria. The game involves two opponents competing under strict regulations governed by the World Chess Federation (FIDE), which standardizes play formats, rankings, and tournament structures across the globe. Much like in traditional athletic contests, players face time constraints, compete in championship events, and are ranked based on performance. Chess competitions, particularly at the highest levels, demand rapid decision-making and intense focus—skills honed through years of study and practice.

One of the most compelling arguments for chess as a sport is the level of training and mental discipline it requires. Professional players dedicate countless hours to studying openings, mastering

endgames, analyzing historical matches, and preparing for specific opponents. The cognitive load during a single high-stakes match is enormous, with players needing to anticipate threats, formulate long-term strategies, and adapt to shifting positions in real-time. This mirrors the discipline of athletes who drill plays and train their bodies for peak performance. The key difference lies not in the absence of movement, but in the presence of sustained intellectual rigor.

Additionally, chess is a competitive arena that demands emotional resilience and psychological fortitude. Players are under constant pressure to perform, often for hours at a time, with small mistakes having monumental consequences. The intensity of a chess match can rival that of any physically demanding sport, as players experience adrenaline spikes, mental exhaustion, and the emotional swings of victory or defeat. Grandmasters like Magnus Carlsen and Judit Polgar have spoken openly about the psychological demands of professional play, emphasizing how emotional control is just as critical as technical skill.

Chess also holds global cultural recognition and influence akin to traditional sports. With millions of players worldwide and growing online platforms like Chess.com and Lichess, the game has seen a surge in viewership and participation. International championships attract media coverage and live audiences, while legendary players have achieved celebrity

status. Moreover, national investments in chess education—especially in countries like India, Russia, and Armenia—underscore its value as both a competitive and developmental tool. These efforts mirror how traditional sports foster national pride and cultural identity through social cohesion.

Those who argue against chess being a sport often cite its lack of physical exertion. However, this perspective overlooks the fact that not all sports rely on physical intensity to the same degree. Archery, shooting, and eSports, for example, are recognized as sports because of their demand for precise mental focus and competitive structure—qualities chess possesses in abundance. The essence of sport lies in its ability to challenge the human spirit, test one's limits, and offer a stage for excellence, regardless of whether those limits are physical or intellectual.

In light of these factors—its codified rules and governance, rigorous skill demands, emotional and psychological challenges, and global competitive framework—it becomes clear that chess is far more than a pastime. It is a true sport, one that champions the mind over muscle, yet embodies all the discipline, competition, and cultural significance of more physically oriented games. Recognizing chess as a sport not only broadens our definition of athletic excellence but also honors the intellectual achievements of those who dedicate their lives to mastering its complexity.

A REVIEW OF EUROPE

The William Aberhart music program very recently visited Europe for its bi-annual music tour! The previous music tour, held two years ago, took place in Quebec and Ontario, while this one traveled from Germany to Austria and finally ended in the Czech Republic. This entire journey spanned the length of 11 days, from March 19 to March 29, ensuring a busy schedule each new morning all the way until the night. In this review of Europe, I draw very heavily from my own experience and will be highlighting what I took away as the most important aspects of the trip; this is not a universal account of the trip! And so, without further ado, let us start with Germany.



Our visit to Germany centered mainly around Munich, the capital of Bavaria. We were able to witness this beautiful city firsthand via a walking tour. During this tour, the aspect of the city that stood out to me the most was the architecture. The architecture in Munich has staples


of many prominent architectural movements, from the Baroque churches to the neo-Gothic New Town Hall--every step taken on the cobblestone road led you to a new discovery of beauty you had never seen before. Unfortunately, we were on a tight schedule, so we were only able to spend one day exploring Germany. The next day we were off to Austria!

The first stop in Austria was Salzburg, the city of Mozart's birthplace. The highlight of this city was certainly learning about the history of Salzburg. In particular, our group had the chance to visit the very house that Mozart was born in, which was a dizzying experience. It's a unique feeling when you step into a place of such historic significance as a modern onlooker; you, with the gift of being in present times, know why this place holds such significance, and yet, this pristine museum that you've entered into used to be a lively home where the people did not know they were making history because they were simply too busy being people.

We said goodbye to Salzburg at the end of the day and said hello to Vienna instead! One of the main highlights of Vienna was being able to tour the Schönbrunn Palace. The Schönbrunn Palace was the



main summer residence of the House of Habsburg, a very powerful imperial house that was also a monarchy from the year 1282 to 1918. Walking through the palace gave the same dizzying feeling that walking through Mozart's house had with the sheer amount of history embedded into the palace. However, unlike Mozart's house, the palace was simply on a different level of dazzling beauty. The most notable piece was the Great Gallery. With its sprawling ceiling covered by three Rococo-style paintings, the ornately carved wooden and gilt chandeliers, and the plethora of gold detailing that lines the walls and ceiling, it is understandable why the room harbors the name the Great Gallery.



Our final destination was the Czech Republic! One of the towns we visited was Litomyšl, the hometown of Bedřich Smetana. Smetana is considered the father of Czech music, considering his accomplishments of putting Czech on the musical map with his brilliant compositions and bringing elements of Czech art and culture into classical music. We were able to attend a guided tour of his house, and the highlight was a room that projected animations on three sides of the wall while Smetana's music sang through the air. The animation was gorgeous and added to the



immersive effect of the music, letting me gain a new sense of appreciation for his music.

The next stop in Czech was its capital city, Prague! One of the first landmarks we saw in Czech was its National Theatre, and there are no synonyms of beauty that can describe the theatre. There are gold embellishments and details in every crevice of the building--the intricacies of each showcase the sheer craftsmanship needed to create a statue even the size of one's palm. And that is not even to mention the paintings that sprawl above you on the ceilings, dazzling in their grandeur and beauty. It's a wonder that people are able to focus on the performance in front of them when there's already so much to admire from the building alone!

The Prague Castle district was another tour we went on. Personally, the highlight of the tour by far was being able to see the stained-glass window that was designed by Alphonse Mucha in the St. Vitus Cathedral. The cathedral is the largest church in Prague and took nearly 600 years to finish building! The district's Golden Lane was the very street where Franz Kafka briefly lived and wrote his short story called "A Country Doctor." You can even step into his house to purchase a copy and it will be stamped with an official sign that you

bought it in his house.

Even though I have only been mentioning the positive sides of Europe, the history of WWII loomed almost constantly above the places we visit. From the square where Hitler made his speeches in Munich, to the bombed buildings of Austria that had to be rebuilt, Lidice is where the specter of WWII became an almost alive force. The town of Lidice was destroyed during Nazi occupation because of the death of a German SS officer who was assassinated by a resistant Czech group. In retaliation, Nazi Germany completely demolished the small town in the name of contrived security, murdering all the boys and men who were older than 15 years. The majority of the






