

Researching Post-Secondary Requirements and how it Supports your Course Selections

- Should you decide to go to a Post-Secondary institution you will need to research each institution you would consider applying to and see what courses the institution considers for admission.
- Essentially you research the faculty/program at each Post-Secondary institution as admission requirements can vary and do change year to year.
- See what might keep your doors open
- See what might give you a competitive advantage in applying. For example, could you use Math 30-2 to get into your desired program?
- You may decide if a diploma or a degree is a better starting point for you.







Which Grade 12 Courses are Universities Considering?

- Most universities consider 5 courses, one of which will be English 30-1.
- Faculties at each university will have admission requirements.
- Many universities outside of the province of Alberta will not consider grade 12 complementary courses for admission. Students/families need to research and understand what courses will be considered for admission to your faculty/university of choice.
- Within Alberta some Post-Secondary institutions will consider complementary courses for admission.
- The Alexander Rutherford Scholarship will consider most complementary courses.

. Alberta High School Diploma Requirements

- Earn a minimum of 100 credits
- English Language Arts 30 level (grade 12)
- Social 30 level (grade 12)
- Mathematics 20 level (grade 11)
- Science 20 level (grade 11)
- Physical Education 10 (grade 10)
- Career and Life Management
- 10 credits in Second Languages, Career and Technology Studies, Fine Arts, and/or Physical Education 20/30
- 10 credits in any 30 level (grade 12) course (in addition to Social Studies and English Language Arts)



Prerequisite Courses











- Most courses in high school require a
 prerequisite course. A prerequisite course is a
 course which must be successfully completed
 before a student can proceed to the next level.
- It is the student's responsibility to ensure they have the appropriate prerequisite course before selecting courses.
- Talk to your guidance counsellor or subject teacher to ask about prerequisites.

Science Course Sequence










Science Program



 Students who have achieved a final mark of 50% or greater in any one of Biology 20, Chemistry 20, Physics 20 or Science 20 may enrol in Science 30.





AP Comparative Government and Politics









 Examine the political institutions and processes of six different countries—China, Iran, Mexico, Nigeria, Russia, and the United Kingdom—and compare the ways they address problems. You'll analyze data and readings to draw conclusions about political systems.









 Ask your subject teacher for an initial on your course selection sheet if you are asking for AP courses.









General Guidelines for Academic Success & Wellness

- Take a maximum of 6 core courses per year (3 in each semester). Students often take extra academic classes to keep more doors open but this can result in a lower average if the student is over burdened.
- Choose the academic stream (-1, -2, -3) for each subject carefully in consultation with your subject teachers and your parents.
- Include physical activity in or outside of your timetable.
- Include complementary courses in your timetable.
- Get involved in extra-curricular activities.

Reduce Stress Levels









- Remember there are many paths to reach your Post-Secondary goals:
 - You can apply to more than one institution
 - You can apply to an institution with a lower competitive admission average
 - You can usually apply for two programs on one Post-Secondary application. Make sure your second choice has an achievable grade point average.
 - You may be able to upgrade your courses by taking them online through CBe-Learn or in summer school.
 - Some students may decide to do a gap year and upgrade at Chinook Learning

Course Selection Process









- 1. Guidance Counsellors give a virtual presentation of the course selection process to Grade 11 students on **February 3**.
- 2. Students/families fill in the course selection form including a parent signature.
- 3. Put your course requests into PowerSchool (see next slides). Please have these entered no later than February 12th.
- 4. Please return a copy of the signed course selection form to the classroom in which you saw the virtual presentation by **February 12th**.
- 5. We will have the opportunity for students to ask questions at an assigned time in the computer lab.




Enter Course Requests

On the left-side Navigation menu, click on Class Registration.

On the Welcome page, you will see a message from your school about class registration. Below, you will see multiple registration sections that you must complete.

- This icon indicates that you need to select additional courses to request in this section.
- This icon indicates that all course request requirements have been fulfilled in this section.
- To begin requesting courses, click on the pencil button in the first registration section.
- A pop-up menu will appear with course options. Select the course(s) you are requesting by placing a check mark in the box beside the course name.
 - Note | if a teacher has made a course recommendation, it will appear in the Alerts column.
- The alert at the bottom of the page will track how many courses you have selected. The red exclamation mark will change to a green check mark when all requirements have been fulfilled. Once you have selected the correct amount of courses, click Okay to continue.

Creating Timetables










• We work hard to create timetables given the student's top choices.
